

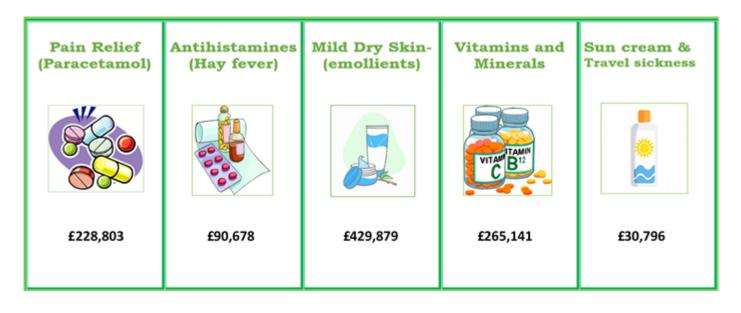
Merton CCG encourages self-care for minor, self-limiting health conditions. Patients should be encouraged to buy these medicines where possible. Community Pharmacists can provide advice on suitable self-management, offering appropriate treatment and preventing the need for a GP or nurse appointment. This is in line with all South West London CCGs and NHSE commissioning policy. Further information, and support materials can be found on the Merton CCG website here and GPTeamNet here.

There are 35 minor conditions for which routine prescribing is no longer supported by the NHSE. Some of these include:

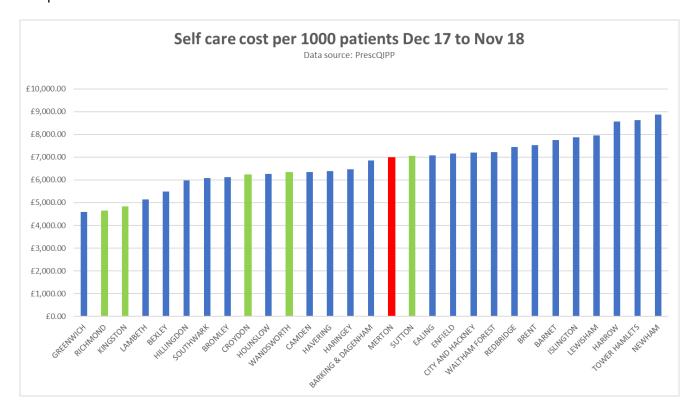

In 2018 Merton CCG spent approximately over £1,500,000 on prescription medicines that could have been bought over the counter (OTC). Patients should be advised to buy these items to treat minor or self-limiting conditions, even if they are exempt from prescription charges. There are exceptions to this guidance which includes patients with complex illness or long term conditions. These should continue to be prescribed on NHS prescriptions. The graph below shows Merton CCG cost per 1000 patient on medicines which can be purchased 'over the counter' to treat minor or self-limiting conditions from December 17 to November 18 compared to other London CCGs.



Graph below shows practice spend per 1000 patients from December 17 to November 18. Practices will be monitored and supported towards reduction in spend.
